Eighteen impactful events engaged 1,686 participants, including students, parents, Panchayat members, ICDS staff, and healthcare workers. The events centered around themes of child rights, protection against exploitation, and child-friendly governance. fostering These collaborative efforts aimed to nurture child-

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friendly environments in schools and communities.

KEY ACTIVITIES:

- Rallies and Awareness Drives: Raised visibility on child rights and the fight against child exploitation.
- Interactive Competitions: Showcased children's creativity through sit-and-draw contests, speeches, and cultural programs.
- · Participatory Discussions: Explored child labor, trafficking, and governance, formalizing child protection committees.
- Community Engagement: Empowered parents and local leaders to support girls' education and inclusive governance.

The events left a lasting imprint, evidenced by these outcomes:

- Direct engagement with over 400 girls, bridging gender gaps in education.
- Creation of the "Mener Katha Box," allowing children to voice concerns.
- Strengthened collaboration between schools, Panchayats, and NGOs.

Participants embraced the initiative, requesting expanded topics such as mental health, gender sensitivity, and adolescent health. These requests reflected pressing concerns within the community, such as increasing awareness of mental wellbeing, addressing gender inequities, and ensuring adolescents are equipped to handle challenges during their formative years. Teachers and community leaders emphasized the value of continued, localized programs.

LEARNINGS

The program provided valuable learnings to guide future initiatives. The effectiveness of visual aids and participatory activities highlighted the importance of creative engagement strategies for sustaining interest and enhancing understanding. Logistical planning emerged as a critical area of focus, with the need for robust backup systems and flexible arrangements to ensure smooth event

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THE WAY FORWARD

To sustain and amplify these efforts, the following actions are recommended:

- **Train Facilitators:** Equip them with event management and child protection strategies.
- **Broaden Campaigns:** Include adolescent health, gender sensitivity, and climate education.
- **Expand Infrastructure:** Establish child help desks in more schools for rights-related concerns.
- Follow-Up Mechanisms: Conduct regular reviews and maintain community engagement.
